Dear Parents and Friends of the SMJ Community,

Term 3 has got off to a flying start with many things happening at school that are keeping our little people very busy. Last week we celebrated NAIDOC week at school with various activities happening in learning communities and in specialist classes. It was a great way as a school to recognise the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in our country.

Over the holidays and beginning of last week we had Mrs Consedine and Miss Marr attend the Reggio Emilia conference in Perth. The Reggio Emilia approach to learning links closely with our school philosophy on how students learn best. The Reggio Emilia Philosophy is an innovative and inspiring approach to early childhood education, which values the child as strong, capable and resilient; rich with wonder and knowledge. The Philosophy rides on the coattails of the innate curiosity of children and aims to assist them with understanding their world and who they are in it. Mrs C and Miss Marr have come back from the conference enthused and loaded with new ideas that they will look to implement in our school. Last week we also had Mrs Abbott, Mrs McKinnon and Miss Roll pack their bags and head to Melbourne for a couple of days for a Professional Learning Communities study tour. They visited Chelsea Heights and Pearcedale Primary Schools near Frankston. Both of these schools have turned around their academic achievement in recent years and are now going from strength to strength. Again our three teachers have come back with many new ideas and understandings that will only benefit our school community into the future.

The Resilience Project program continues to be implemented across our school with our students completing weekly lessons and being reminded of the importance of Gratitude, Empathy and Mindfulness (GEM), which all help us to stay mentally heathy. Tomorrow we will participating in learning symposiums.




### WHEELIE WEDNESDAY...31st July






#### **Earn and Learn**


