Sherman Learning Community (Foundation)

We have enjoyed being scientists this week in Foundation, researching all things nature during Investigations. This has stemmed from the children's current fascination in plants, animals and the environment. We are starting to intergrate aspects of the Reggio Emilia approach in our space which is a child-centred, interest-based way of learning that utilises natural materials. This week has also seen the introduction of plants into our space which the children have loved looking after! In Maths, we have

began learning about subtraction. We are getting better at taking smaller numbers away from larger numbers using different strategies. This is a skill that the children can continue to practise at home with every day objects.

BRIGID LEARNING COMMUNITY (1/2)

Welcome to week 3. We are starting to make very strong links to our local community and our local environment. We are sharing how we should look after the classroom environment and take greater responsibility in looking after our environment outside. Some of us have shared how we catch insects inside and release them outside in their natural environment. Our focus in mathematics is multiplicative thinking. We read, make and record equal groups. We are making lots of equal groups with counters and using the words, 3 rows of 4 is 12 etc. Our reading focus is looking at the features of Non-fiction texts, glossaries, indexes and contents pages and how technical language in non-fiction texts need to be unpacked and enjoyed. We are all really enjoying writing Information reports by including researched facts and diagrams. During Resilience Project lessons we are sharing our understandings and examples of compromise and listening to others and respecting their ideas and views.

LYNCH LEARNING COMMUNITY (3/4)

We have been working on 3D shapes. We are making robots out of paper nets. Most of us are nearly done. On other notes the junior disco is on tomorrow night, it starts at 6pm and goes till 8pm, so come down and have a bit of fun! We also have Beanie Day on the 7th August. Wheelie Wednesday was postponed and will now be on Wednesday 14th August. In reading we have still been finding information out about the thylacine. In writing we are exploring the use of strong verbs in sentences about animals. Our Inquiry topic is Celebrations and we have worked with a partner to create a Venn Diagram about a celebration we celebrate and how it compares and contrasts.

MADDEN LEARNING COMMUNITY (5/6)

On Monday we focused on Matthew Flinders and his circumnavigation of Terra Australis (land southern or southern land). We learnt new card games including Beg My Neighbour, War, Math Memory and Speed. We completed learning symposiums about our inquiry. This is where we presented our research and discoveries so far. We then completed a five minute feedback session where the person that is speaking gets asked questions and suggestions for further research are presented. In the afternoon we looked at resilience through the lense of negative emotions and how we can deal with them as well as THINKing before we speak.

On Tuesday we worked on spelling. We completed a math pretest about money. We also looked at Lord Morton and Eddie Mabo, we developed questions and researched them.

For our specialist day we practised our spelling. In art we had to choose three different shapes (circle, triangle, square). Then we had to design our own pattern for each shape. For Indonesian we started to design a poster for Indonesian puppets (wayang kulit). For sport we played a volleyball like game and we were in four teams with about 4-5 people.

Today we are continuing on with history, looking at the communication used in Van Diemen's land (Tasmania) between convicts, settlers and Indigenous people. This afternoon we are focusing on our inquiry research.

Tomorrow we are having the write a book in a day students present assembly, learning more about history and our individual research missions. For parents information: Next week we are having a "history week". If you have any family history or resources that you would like to share then please let us know.


Author spotlight ...
